Fishing Pole Plant Damaged by Blaze

A defective oil-burner caused a \$4,000 fire at the Tours-a-Grip company plant, 4114 Crooks road, Sunday evening. It is believed that the oil continued to flow through the burner after the flames had gone out. A sudden spark sent a flash through the 30 x 100 concrete block building, firemen said.

Clude K. Kolb, building owner, who lives near the plant, reported the fire at about 7 p.m. Four trucks from the two stations of the Troy township department answered the call, along with equipment from Lawson.

Kolb said about half of the building and stock was damaged. The building was converted from a chicken house into a small manufacturing plant during the war years. Later it was taken over by the Tours-a-Grip company which was then manufacturing fishing poles.

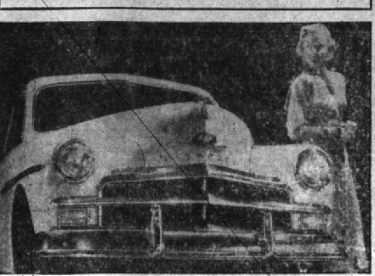
