Astonishing Facts

Stressing the need for vigilance in watching for subversive activities, Mrs. Harman F. They were compiled by Seth W. Richardson, chairman of loyalty review board, Washington, D.C.
The astonished group of 30 members, assembled at the home of Mrs. John Diederich of Santa toga boulevard, read the names of 172 subversive organizations having membership of tens of thousands.

Mrs. Laurs said the Republican club of this area intends to contact every qualified voter of both parties, to try and influence them to go to the polls at the 1952 election.
She said, "Over the nation there are 94,000,000 eligible voters, and 67,000,000 registered voters. Only 48,000,000 went to the polls last election, and 7,000,000 more than 24,000,000 votes. The supposition is that those who didn't bother to vote were of the opinion that the men up for election were not qualified to hold the presidency; the choice was not worth the trouble."
