Color motion pictures of an adventure-packed winter in an Arctic trapper's cabin will be shown by C. J. Albrecht, explorer and big game hunter, when he speaks on "Adventures Under Northern Lights" for the World Adventure Series at 9:30 next Sunday after noon, Jan. 15, at the Detroit Institute of Arts.

Albrecht pictures gay evenings at frontier Hudson Bay trading posts, following mammoth herds of caribou 300 miles, trapping pelts by dog-team, trailing wolf packs, moonlight campfires with the temperature 61 below zero, living with Indians, photographing bowmen, mink, ermine, otter, fox, getting lost in the blizzard-swept Barrens.
