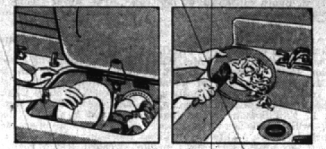

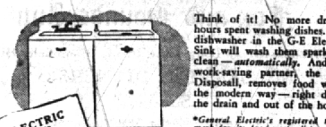
The speaker, the Rev. Charles Jatho, is the rector of St. John's Episcopal Church in Royal Oak and has a wide reputation as a stimulating talker.

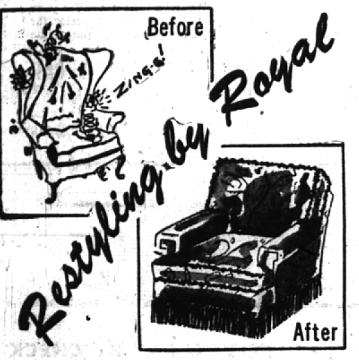
