

Panel Discussion at Monthly Meeting Held by League

The League of Women Voters held their January membership meeting Monday in the Community House. Mrs. F. G. Garrison was chairman of the day. With her committee, she presented an international affairs round table on "Steps Toward World Security Through Economic Balance".

The panel was composed of Mrs. Garrison, Mrs. E. W. Gaffil, Mrs. Norval Frugh, Mrs. Charles Shain, Mrs. James Duncan, Mrs. Eugene Heaz, Mrs. Howard Willett and Mrs. W. J. Kelly. Mrs. Allen Lutz was moderator.

Discussion revolved around a re-assessment of the Marshall Plan and an explanation of President Truman's Point Four. Mrs. Garrison opened the program with the remark that "Asia is a powder keg, and while we feel nationalism is going down in the west, it is certainly rising in the East."

Mrs. Gaffil explained the Marshall Plan and why Western Europe must be united, bringing out that Western Europe needs to export more and import less and that already industrial production is 25% over that of pre-war.

Mrs. Frugh showed the struggle that Communism made in Italy against the Marshall Plan and why it lost. Mrs. Shain summarized her talk with Senator Ferguson in regards to the Plan and how he saw it operating in Europe while Point Four was covered by Mrs. Duncan.

After questions had been asked of the panel by the audience, Mrs. Lutz gave a summary ending with "Steps toward world security that mean actually steps toward getting the nations on a paying basis—balanced economy and peace grow together".

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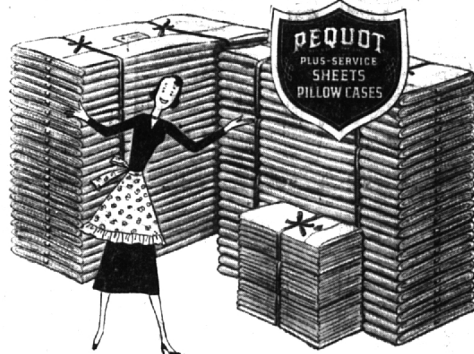
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
