In 1950, National Youth Week includes the period of Jan. 29-Feb. 5. The local event of interest in this program will be held Sunday evening, Jan. 29, at 6 p.m. in the First Baptist church. The program is sponsored by the Birmingham Council of Churches, with young people of all the churches in the community participating.

The theme of the meeting will be "Brotherhood—in Practice." Religious films on this subject will be presented, followed by comments from a panel of the young people. The topic will then be open for free discussion by all present.

After the meeting there will be a buffet supper for all attending. Chairmen of the various committees planning the event are: arrangements, Jan Turner; program, Elaine Kuntz; decorations, Nancy Kuntz; publicity, Rosemary Hicks; music, Frank Poole, property, Richard Kuntz, Edwin F. Gilliam, secretary of the Birmingham Council of Churches, is the adult advisor of the group.

The general theme of National Youth Week is "God Designs—Youth Builds." The aim is to have young people inquire into the essential purpose which God intends to fulfill for humanity, and then have youth resolutely share in achieving that high purpose in personal character and social conduct. The local youth group will initiate its thinking in the matter of building true brotherhood by wholesome attitudes and constructive contacts.
