RESOLVED, that the Administrative and Legislative branches of the State Government be requested to forthwith investigate the extent of power and authority now existing to adopt and enforce regulations pertaining to the transmission and distribution of gas, with especial emphasis on public safety, and to recommend the creation by legislation or otherwise of such additional power and authority as may be deemed advisable for such purposes.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that copies of this resolution be transmitted to the Honorable G. Mennen Williams, Governor of the State of Michigan, Honorable Howard B. Edson, Member of the House of Representatives, Honorable George N. Higgins, State Senator from the Twelfth District, and further, that copies be forwarded to the State Fire Marshal and the Attorney General of the State of Michigan.
