Pedestrian Injuries Causes Police Chief To Warn Motorists

Two recent pedestrian accidents in Birmingham has brought a warning from Police Chief Ralph W. Moxley for motorists to exercise more caution.

"Neither of these accidents was serious, but both were caused by the driver of a car refusing to yield the right of way to the pedestrian."

"The next two weeks are probably the most dangerous ones in the year," he said. "Records show that traffic accidents, year after year, reach their peak at this time."

"It is especially true of the hours when workers are returning home in the early evening. Drivers and pedestrians are tired and anxious to get home. Drivers must remember that the pedestrian is cold as well as tired, and that he cannot travel as fast."

"He must also remember that no one can be as good a driver in January on ice as he can in June on bare paving—if he uses the same technique. The good driver remembers the weather and handles his car accordingly."

"I urge caution for the sake of the driver himself, as much as for any other reason. When you drive, treat the man on the street exactly the way you like to be treated when you walk from place to place. That way will be the safe way, because no one likes narrow escapes from thoughtless drivers."
