B'ham National Deposits Are Up 10% in 6 Months

At the July 6 meeting of the board of directors of The Birmingham National Bank, a 10 per cent increase in deposits for the first six months of 1950 was reported to the board.

"The growth of the bank during this period reflects the steady increase of population in Birmingham and its environs, and the rising volume of mercantile and industrial activity throughout the area," declared H. H. Gardner, president.

The board declared a semi-annual dividend of 60 cents on the \$10 par value shares of the bank, payable on July 12 to stockholders of record as of July 8, 1950.

Edison Engineer Killed in Crash

Samuel Firestone, 44, of Detroit, died en route to Mt. Carmel hospital last week Wednesday, shortly after his car and a fruit truck collided at the intersection of Nine Mile and Greenfield roads.

Mr. Firestone, district planning engineer for the Birmingham office of the Detroit Edison, was traveling south on Greenfield when the accident occurred. The truck was driven by Cyrus Elliott of Detroit, traveling east on Nine Mile.

Elliott told police he had stopped for the intersection and had just started forward when the car struck his truck. There were no witnesses.

Mr. Firestone was born in Cincinnati, Ohio on June 21, 1906. He was graduated from the University of Michigan with a BSEE degree in 1927 and that year began as a cadet engineer with Detroit Edison.

FROM 1928 to 1948 he worked as an engineer in the planning division and on Nov. 15, 1948 was named district planning engineer for the Birmingham office.

He was a member of the Engineering Society of Detroit, Perfection lodge, F. & A. M., and was a registered professional engineer.

He is survived by his wife, Freda; his mother, Mrs. Helen Firestone; a daughter, Dorothy and a son, Bernard, all of Detroit. Services were held Thursday afternoon from the Ira Kaufman funeral chapel in Detroit with burial in Clover Hill Park cemetery.
