Latest Government Information Gives Safe, Proper Canning Methods

Here's some advice on safe home canning issued today by the Michigan Department of Health. Improperly canned food can be poisonous when it either looks or tastes bad, the Department warned.

"Can everything except tomatoes and fruit by the pressure cooker method, if it is at all possible. When non-acid food such as vegetables, meats and poultry are canned by any other method, the contents of each can must be at least 15 minutes cooked before they are even tasted."

USE BOILING WATER bath for fruits and tomatoes only. Cold pack nothing except tomatoes. Never can lima beans or corn in anything larger than a pint jar. Even pressure cooking cannot make these vegetables safe in larger containers.

Never can in the oven. The danger of explosion and burns is too great, and then the product canned in the crowded oven may not be safe.

Get the latest government time tables and directions for any type of canning and follow them exactly. Use only time tables and directions issued since 1947.

Can only fresh foods in the best condition.

Be sure that all food for canning, hardware, tools and all canning equipment is clean. Rusted lids are immaculately clean. Read carefully and observe the manufacturer's instructions for the type of lid you are using.
