

Whiting-Weyand Win Invitational Tourney Here

Dick Whiting of Red Run and Gollie Weyand of Birmingham teamed last weekend to win the annual Birmingham Country club best ball tournament. They defeated Perry Byard of Birmingham and Ed Flowers of Oakland Hills 5 and 4 in the final Sunday afternoon.

The winning team was three under par in the match. Byard and Flowers were not as outclassed as the score indicates as both men had tough luck on the greens.

A GALLERY of 50 to 75 persons followed the foursome around the course until Whiting and Weyand clinched the match on the 14th hole.

Defending champions Harry and George Linblatter were eliminated Friday by Steve Pardo and Nick Smirnow, 3 and 1.

One of the highlights of the four-day event was the playoffs Thursday afternoon for five positions in the championship flight. Six teams which had scores of 71 left the first tee as darkness was closing in. Funds Are Invested By Retirement Board; Consultant Named

At the regular quarterly meeting of the city retirement board, held last Wednesday, A. G. Gabriel, Detroit, was renamed actuarial consultant to the board at a salary of \$200 per year. His term will end June 30, 1951, according to Russell Berger, board chairman.

Berger announced that the board had received the allocation of the City of Birmingham share of the employees' retirement fund, and had invested \$39,634.90 in Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul equipment trusts; Erie railroad equipment trusts; Chesapeake and Ohio equipment trusts; International Harvester and American Telephone and Telegraph common stocks and American Cyanamide preferred stocks.

"These investments were made upon the recommendations of Herbert H. Gardner, head of our investment committee," Berger said.

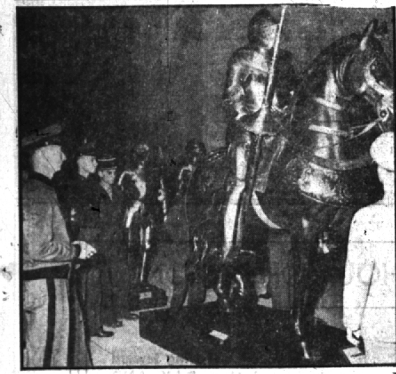
