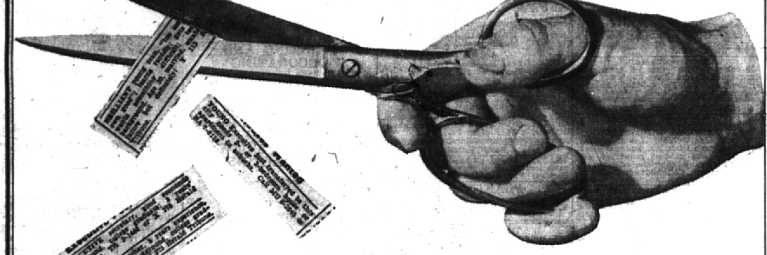
At present, the bridegroom-to-be is employed with the Pontiac Motor Division in Washington, D. C.

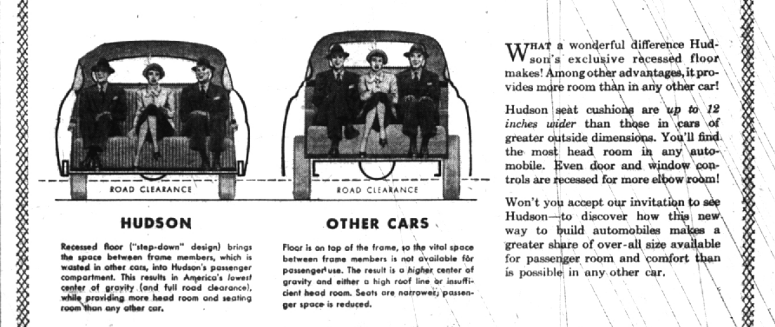

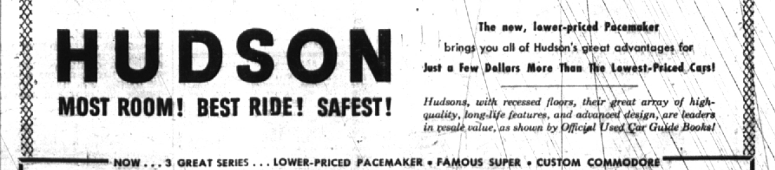
