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Odds Favor Incumbents For Additional Terms On City Commission

If a Birmingham city commissioner chooses to run for re-election at the end of his three-year term, the odds are 3-1 in his favor.

Since the city incorporated in 1933, incumbents have run for office successfully 22 out of 26 times.

This means that incumbents have filled over 80 per cent of the 41 available positions that came up for election since 1933.

Including the seven original city commissioners, 27 different men have held 48 positions for a total of 196 years served on the governing body of Birmingham.

233 Graduated from Junior High

THREE MEN held office for four terms; John E. Martz, Ray A. Palmer, and the late William E. Moore.

All three of these men were chosen mayor by their fellow commissioners; Martz for eight consecutive years, from 1936-43.

Three men are served on the commission for three terms; Frank S. Packard, William Cott Alee and Milton B. Mallender.

There have been five men elected to two terms: Lawrence Hulbert, Art J. Kane, Luther Hancock, Ralph L. Coryell and Ralph A. Main.

Kane and Coryell were both defeated in attempts for third terms.

19 NEW MEN who collected enough votes to gain commission seats did it either by stacking vigorous campaigns or picking years to run in which commissioners chose to retire on the expiration of their terms.

The seven offices on the Birmingham city commission came up for re-election in the following manner: every three years, three men are voted in; in the two years between, two offices are filled each year.

For the three-commissioner elections, the average field of candidates is five. The two-commissioner elections average three or four office-seekers.

The largest field was for the original commission when 17 men tried for seven jobs.

SECOND HIGHEST was in 1947, when seven new men went after openings.

There have been two unopposed elections in Birmingham's commission history so far. In 1938, original city commissioner Frank S. Packard and Mayor John E. Martz came up for re-election at the same time.

The two men evidently scared off any opposition; Martz was also unopposed in his fourth try for office in 1944, when he and William Cott Alee were re-elected the later for a third term.

All at all boils down to the fact that city commissioners in Birmingham appear to have a large amount of job security.

Mrs. Frances McCown Reineke, 75, one of the charter members of the Birmingham Church of Christ, Scientist, died at her home, 615 North Woodward, last Thursday. She had been ill about a month.

Mrs. Reineke and her husband, the late William Justus Reineke, were among the group which founded the church in Birmingham in 1916.

Some of the early meetings of the new society were held at the Reineke home. Mrs. Reineke was named second reader of the church at its first formal election.

SHE WAS BORN on Oct. 28, 1873 at West Plains, Mo., and in 1896 was married to Mr. Reineke at Springfield. The family came to Birmingham from Detroit 33 years ago.
