Remind Dog Owners of City Ordinance As Vacations Start
Police Chief Ralph W. Moxley this week reminds dog owners of the city ordinance which prohibits letting their dogs run at large.
"The number of dog bite cases have been increasing in the city," Chief Moxley said. "In July there were fifteen cases reported with nineteen in June."
Since July and August are usually the worst months for dog bites because of the school vacation period, children, with more free time on their hands, manage to come in contact with more dogs.
"I WANT YOU remind dog owners that the city ordinance states that all dogs must be kept on a leash or under reasonable control by some person at all times."
"The cooperation of dog owners in obeying this ruling will not only protect themselves and their pets but will also protect children from the danger of bites."
