ORCHARD LAKE PUBLIC FISHING SITE—RULES AND REGULATIONS located in the Village of Orchard Lake, Oakland County of Act 17, Public Acts of 1921, as amended.)

IT SHALL BE UNLAWFUL:

1. To occupy this site without having in possession an unexpired fishing license issued to the bearer. Children under 17 years of age must be accompanied by adults.
2. To establish a camp on this site.
3. To anchor or leave boats unattended overnight or to store or leave fish shanties on this site.
4. To park cars or trailers on the site except at designated places, or to drive cars on the ice of Orchard Lake.
5. To use this site for picnicking or swimming.
6. To remove or change clothing within camp or toilet on the premises.
7. To build open fires on the site.
8. To leave cans, bottles, papers, rubbish, refuse, or garbage on the ground or in the lake.
9. To remove or injure trees, shrubs, or plants or to remove sand, gravel, mud, clay, or other minerals from the site.
10. To remove, deface, or injure any building, equipment, improvement, sign, or other public property.
11. To place or distribute advertising signs or literature on the site.
12. To occupy this site during the time when Orchard Lake is closed to all fishing.
13. To enter or occupy this site during certain hours of each day as may be determined by the Director of Conservation and Fisheries.

These rules and regulations shall be in force and effect from June 20, 1950, to June 20, 1951.

PENALTY

Violation of any rule or regulation set forth herein is punishable by a fine of not more than \$100 and costs of prosecution, or by imprisonment in the county jail for not more than 90 days, or by both such fine and imprisonment at the discretion of the court.
