Board of Appeals Denies Franklin Company's Request

WALNUT LAKE—A petition by the Franklin Products company to the appeal board of the West Bloomfield township for an "addition" to their factory on Orchard Lake road was denied by the board at a special meeting May 24.

Basic for the decision was that the new structure is not an addition, but a new plant, approximately twice the size of the old. The buildings would lie too close to the road in a residential area and the factory is a non-conforming use.

About 40 property owners protested granting the permit. They took the stand that it might prejudice future zoning in the area, and recommended the employment of an unbiased technical expert to work with the zoning board in planning the new ordinance.

The township board will take up the question of adopting a new act on zoning ordinance at the next regular meeting, June 13.

A petition from A. R. Howard to use a residential-type building at 439 E. Frank for business purposes has been denied by the city commission. The building is in an area zoned for multiple family.
