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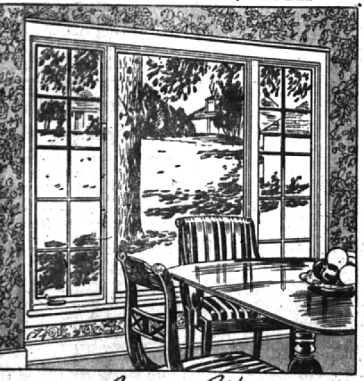

Arnold Dewey, 44, Dies Unexpectedly

Arnold N. Dewey, 44, Great Lakes Greyhound driver, suffered a fatal heart attack last Thursday afternoon shortly after completing his Detroit run. Mr. Dewey had just returned to his home at 84 Hazel street where he collapsed.

He was born in Sanilac county on Oct. 31, 1905, and came to Birmingham from City 24 years ago. He had been driving for Great Lakes Greyhound since that time, and last February was honored for a 42-year safety record.

Mr. Dewey, a member of the Multi-Lakes conservation club, married Sadie Lowrie on May 31, 1930. She survives with the following sisters and brothers: Mrs. Pearl Marsh, Midland; Mrs. Robert Primeau, Detroit; Roy Dewey, Great Lakes and Harold and Martin Dewey of Inlay City.

Services were held Monday afternoon at the Manley Bailey funeral home with burial in White Chapel cemetery. The Rev. Arnold Runkel of the First Methodist church officiated.

A special tribute was paid to Mr. Dewey Monday when some 50 buses, operating between Pontiac and Detroit, were pulled to the curb and stopped for one minute at the hour of his funeral, 1 o'clock.

"This observance was held in memory of Mr. Dewey's long years of service with the company, his excellent safety record and the courtesy with which he had always treated his passengers," Everett Farr, local manager, said. "It was also a testimonial to him from his fellow drivers."

D. P. Frame Asks Drain Commissioner For Action on Petition

Last week Dudley P. Frame, Southfield township supervisor, requested Earl Clark, county drain commissioner, to act on a petition calling for the designation of a drainage district on McJung avenue.

Frame said the petition was filed March 26, 1949, along with a check for \$300 and as yet preliminary work on the project hasn't started.

The request stated that the situation in that area is rapidly becoming intolerable and with the frequent summer storms will be a health menace.

Frame asked that the drain commissioner advise him when the matter will be taken care of.

Bits of Birmingham

City Commissioner John S. O'Gorman, Jr., figures now that many other municipal building offices have seen the lighting situation greatly improved, perhaps now the commission room will be one of the next on the list for better illumination. House-warmings are being considered seriously by the Birmingham board of education as the new high school, Torry school and additions to Walnut Lake and Franklin schools are completed.

Already having lost a great deal of sleep during the thunderstorm the night before, they were annoyed and notified the police. After diligent checking, officers located the car. The "siren" was found to be front end mounted in an accident so it rubbed on the tire. The police located the owner, a section of a "drunk", fast asleep in bed. Since the car was unable to prove that the man was driving the car, they must simply bow out of the picture and do nothing. They cannot prove what he would naturally deny.

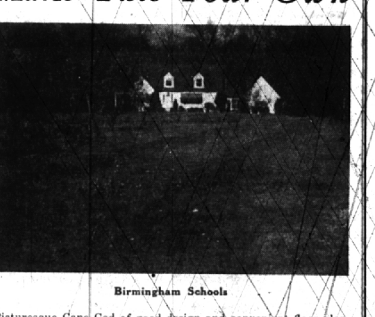
