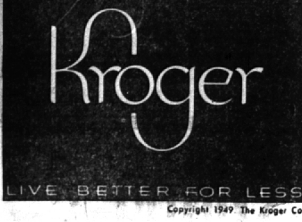

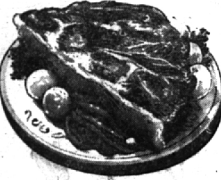

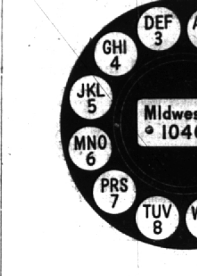

### Dial service is coming to Birmingham

A NEW CHAPTER is about to be written in Birmingham's telephone history. At 12:01 A.M. on Sunday, June 18, the new \$2,400,000 dial telephone system will go into operation here, bringing Birmingham faster and better telephone service.

Heart of the new system will be a new dial central office to be known as Midwest. All Birmingham telephone numbers will be changed and will consist of the prefix Midwest 4 (MI 4) followed by four numerals. For example, MI 4-1046.

When dial service starts June 18, Birmingham telephone customers will be able to:

1. DIAL LOCAL CALLS DIRECT
2. DIAL CALLS DIRECT TO
  - DETROIT
  - MT. CLEMENS
  - CENTER LINE
  - \*PONTIAC
  - \*ROYAL OAK
  - \*SOUTHFIELD
  - \*MAYFAIR
  - \*BIG BEAVER (by dialing 0 and giving number to operator)

\*Birmingham customers who have extended area service may continue to call Royal Oak, Southfield, Mayfair and Big Beaver telephones without charge and will be able to call Pontiac (Federal) telephones without charge starting June 18. See box below.

The whole story of the new dial system is being sent to all Birmingham telephone subscribers in a special booklet. It contains complete instructions on how to place calls. Birmingham subscribers are urged to read the booklet carefully and keep it near the telephone.

To Birmingham customers who have EXTENDED AREA SERVICE:

Starting June 18, PONTIAC (Federal) telephones will be included in your local calling area, bringing the number of telephones you can call toll free to 67,000. New monthly rates for extended area service, based on the increased number of telephones in your local calling area, will become effective June 18.

To all other Birmingham customers:

The present 10c toll charge on calls to PONTIAC (Federal) telephones will be reduced to 5c (one message unit) on June 18. There will be no increase in your monthly service charge.
