Her immediate plans are to enter Western Michigan college where she will take secretarial terminal courses.

The scholarship fund was set up to recognize scholastic ability of boys and girls who were not planning on entering college or university for a degree. It will go

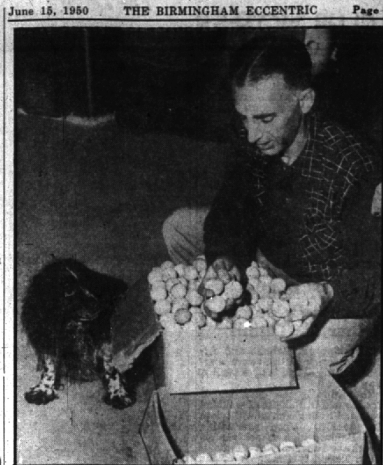
each year to students who plan on vocational or technical courses. The annual awards will be based on scholastic proficiency, character and qualities of all-around ability, keen effort and marked improvement in school work.

Students must show ability to profit from further education in their chosen field and a willingness to study beyond high school, but not necessarily in any college or university.

## YMCA Announces '50 DA-Y Program for Area Children

The Birmingham YMCA has issued a brochure listing 1950 summer DA-Y program for boys and girls 8 through 14. It runs from June 24 through July 31, except Saturdays and Sundays. Hours from 9:30 a. m. to 4:00 p. m.

Each day has one main feature. It may be a trip through an industrial plant or a museum, work with crafts, out-of-door cooking, or a three-day trip to Niagara Falls or Chicago.

As stated by the 'Y' leadership, "The program of those who will attend is designed to meet the needs for directed and supervised activity in events that appeal to the imagination of youngsters.

"FOR ALL, there will be trips to points of interest, hiking, swimming, softball, attendance at Tiger ball games, cook outs and craftwork.

"Camp Totem Pole is not designed as a substitute for an all-round camping experience that may be had at Camps Ohiyesa, Nissakone or Hayo-Went-Ha; rather it is a DA-Y program for boys and girls who are staying at home."

The schedule includes trips to Detroit Zoo, Niagara Falls, Dodge state park, nearby lakes, Detroit Creamery, Continental Baking company, Ford Rouge plant, Edison institute and Greenfield Village, W.W. Hob-Lo, a farm, riding stables, Chicago, Willow Run airport, and a Hi-Y training trip to Camp Hayo-Went-Ha.

THERE IS a nominal all-inclusive charge for the entire summer's program with the exception of the out-of-town trips which includes automobile pickup of the youngsters at home and their return.

Complete details and copies of the brochure may be had on request from the 'Y' office. Parts of the program will be carried out in cooperation with the Birmingham recreation commission.

The entire men's softball program is a joint cooperative program between the 'Y' and the recreation commission.

## Property Owners Aided by New Traffic Ordinance

An ordinance to aid property owners in keeping people from using service drives and other non-public areas for parking was passed by the city commission Monday evening.

Under the provisions of the ordinance, the owners can request the police department to issue a ticket for this illegal parking.

The owner will sign the back of the ticket and agree to appear in court if the motorist demands a trial.

"DETROIT HAS such an ordinance, and in 99 out of 100 cases the offender pays the fine," stated Commissioner John O'Gorman. Commissioner Milton F. Mallerder said the ordinance should provide a great aid to people in the theater parking area who find their drives blocked or occupied.

## Third Tank Moved West to New Site on Derby Road

Test borings for a new 500,000-gallon water storage tank on Derby road just east of the railroad viaduct were approved Monday night by the city commission.

The commission originally decided upon a site at Derby and Eton roads, but changed it to take advantage of a higher location.

To cost an estimated \$90,000, the tank will be the city's third and give the city a total of 1,500,000 gallons of storage. The commission also set June 26 as the hearing date on the necessity of paying Derby from Eton to the viaduct. It would be a 36-foot payment at an estimated cost of \$25,400.
