Set for Sunday

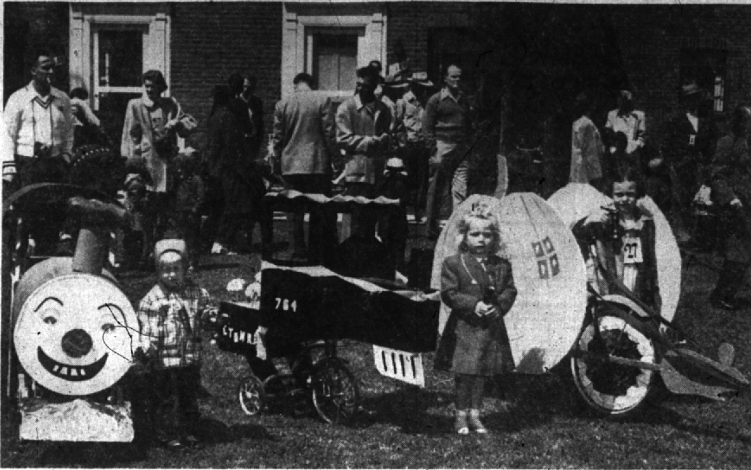
