

Frame Still Waiting For Word Concerning Driver's License Law

Southfield Township Supervisor D. P. Frame said this week that he still hasn't received word from state officials on who may authorize driver's license applications for rural residents.

Earlier this year, Donald S. Leonard, state police commissioner, advised Frame that Attorney General Stephen Roth had been requested to give an opinion whether the state police commissioner or sheriff may authorize

municipal examiners to process driver's license applications for rural residents.

The decision would affect Southfield township residents, as they must now apply for licenses at the sheriff's office in Pontiac. Frame had previously asked Leonard whether township residents could apply at municipalities closer than Pontiac.

The situation is the result of an inadvertent omission in a 1949 amendment to the driver license law of a provision which permitted a rural resident to apply for a driver's license at any examining station located within five miles of his residence.
