Will-O-Way Opens Season With Sharp Comedy Satire

Lights went up at Will-O-Way Monday evening when an all-illustrated audience seated themselves for the season's premiere performance of "Light Up the City," the Moss Hart comedy satire. True to past form, the straw hat theatrains opened their coming series of high-comedy productions with a polished performance and an expert cast. The sharp dialogue of a Hart play was used to perfection by the actors who, as always open Will-O-Way, relaxed every minute on the boards.

Humorous situations are plentiful and chuckles innumerable and Director William Merrill has taken advantage of each opportunity to present a smooth running three act comedy which concerns itself with show people and that in itself speaks for potent possibilities.

In reality, it is a satire on famous personalities in show business and is not a comedy vehicle—each actor being given his chance to show his talent. The first act of the story centers about a truck driver-turned-playwright, his idealistic opinion of show people and his inevitable disillusionment. It shows that stage stars are human and it carries a twist before the final curtain rings down on a pleased audience.

Dolores Rashid handles the roll of Irene Livingston with astuteness and George M. Hunter puts across a true characterization as Sidney Black, the producer. Mrs. Dean Coffin fits through her part with great ease and is a co-comedian with Celia Merrill Turner. The two of them rollick over their lines and "leave an audience laughing."

Gerald Harrington performs in his customary expert manner as the playwright and Tom deTraffenried is cast as Owen Turner. Fred Taylor shines brightly in his brief spot as a stage struck industrialist-Shriner who has "inherited four factories but now has none."

Others in the cast are June Sanderson, Steve Campbell and Milton Todd. Will-O-Way is located at Telegraph and West Long Lake roads. You can't miss it and you won't want to.

Localities Attend National Meeting Mrs. Nelson Miles, Mrs. George Burnham and Mrs. L. Irving Woolson, all of Birmingham, were in Ocean Grove, N. J., last week representing the Detroit Presbyterial of the First Presbyterian Church of Birmingham and the Michigan Synodical at the quadrennial meeting of the National Council of Women's organizations of that church in America. This was the third meeting of the national group which was organized in 1942. Sessions began on June 12 and lasted through the 19th. It represented some half million women in 7500 societies connected with the Presbyterian churches throughout the country. Other matters discussed at sessions during the week included: social pressures such as economic conditions, alcoholism and racial relationships; problems and challenges of higher education; stumbling blocks to spiritual power and new responsibilities toward which the church is moving.
