Ferndale Wins EVIL Meet As Maples Cop Third

Lack of balance again hurt the Maple track team, which finished third behind Ferndale and Port Huron in the Eastern Michigan League track meet at Hazel Park last week.

The same two men who gave the locals second place in the state meet again accounted for most of their 39 1/2 points. Joe Ross won both his specialties, the 100 and 220 yard dashes in record time, tying his own record in the 100 at 13.4 and setting a new record of 22.5 in the 220.

ERIC HEIZER and Howard Liverance took the Maples' other two firsts. State champion in the 410 yard dash, Heizer won his race in 53.8 while Liverance tied with Henry Statton of Ferndale for first place at five feet ten inches.

Bill Morris of Ferndale was the only triple winner of the night when he took first place in the 120 yard high hurdle, the 180 yard low, and the broad jump, besides running anchor on the winning 880 yd. relay team.

The two-race system in the 880 yard run and 440 yard dash profited Ferndale but hindered Birmingham greatly, as the Ferndale boys were placed in the slower of the two races each time, snatching them to collect more points.

The standings in points were Ferndale 63, Port Huron 44 1/2, Birmingham 39 1/2, Mt. Clemens 28, Hazel Park 14 and East Detroit 12.
