Richard A. Saubert, 2769 Pembroke, this week said he was running for election to the Birmingham school board because of the benefits which have come to him and his family since they moved to Birmingham.

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PREVIEW OF YOUR NEW DIAL TELEPHONE SYSTEM

ON JUNE 18, at 12:01 A.M., Birmingham telephone customers will start enjoying dial telephone service.

The new dial central office, to be into operation that day, will be known as "Midwest." It will provide direct dialing of local calls and direct dialing of calls to Detroit, Mt. Clemens, Center Line, Royal Oak, Southfield, Mayfair and Pontiac telephones. Calls to Big Beaver telephones will be made by dialing "70" and giving the number to the operator.

Started more than two years ago, the project has involved installing dials on nearly 11,000 telephones, construction of a new building together with much outside plant, and installation of extensive central office dial switching equipment.

The new capital which was needed to finance this \$2,400,000 dial system has been provided by people from all walks of life who have invested their savings in the telephone business.

This is a view of the new Birmingham telephone building, 160 Martin Street, which houses the dial switching equipment for the new "Midwest" central office and the telephone business office.

With uncanny accuracy, rows of "Crossbar" dial switching equipment like this will enable Birmingham customers to dial local calls and also to dial calls direct to Detroit, Mt. Clemens, Center Line, Pontiac, Royal Oak, Mayfair and Southfield telephones. Dial switching equipment, day and night, responds immediately to the numbers dialed, finds the telephone wanted and reports back if the line is busy.

Another feature of the new dial service for Birmingham will be Automatic Message Accounting... the third installation of its kind in Michigan and one of the few in the entire country. AMA equipment, as it is known, will keep track of chargeable message units and toll charges for calls to certain nearby zones and exchanges. For example, when a Birmingham customer dials a Detroit number, a machine automatically records the customer's telephone number and the length of time he talks by means of perforations on a paper tape. Each day the tapes will be sent to the accounting department where they will be run through decoding machines which will separate the coded billing information for the customer's telephone number. At the end of the month, a machine types out the total number of chargeable message units and toll charges used. From that information the customer's telephone bill is prepared.

AMA keeps an accurate record of many calls simultaneously. Tiny holes in this paper tape form a code showing telephone numbers and the chargeable message units belonging to each. After decoding, machine types out billing information needed.

ALSO on June 18, PONTIAC telephones will be included in the local calling area of Birmingham subscribers who have extended area service, bringing the number of telephones that can be called toll-free by those subscribers to 67,000.

New monthly service rates, based on the increased number of telephones in their local calling area, will become effective June 18 for customers who have extended-area service.

For all other Birmingham customers, the present 10c toll charge for calls to Pontiac will be reduced to 5c (one message unit) on June 18.

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
