Crane's Baseball Schedule Includes 10 Days in South

The first southern training trip since before the war is a feature of the 20-game 1950 schedule released by Cranbrook school. The 10-day tour, beginning March 17, will take the Cranbrook team through the southern part of Virginia and West Virginia.

Three games have been scheduled for the trip, as the Cranes will meet Augusta Military Academy, of Fort Randolph, Va., and a twin meet with Greenbrier military school, in Lewisburg, W. Va. In addition, the team will play a two-day-a-day workout schedule during several days of practice at the University of Virginia, at Washington and Lee university.

Coach Fred Campbell plans to take a 16-man party, including seven lettermen from last year's squad which won 10 games and lost two. Captain Rafe Reynolds, a four-time winner last season, heads the list of pitchers which also includes veteran pitcher John Manley and Tom Galantovic, up from the junior varsity. Jack Knoblauch, who lettered in 1949, will handle most of the catching duties, with the help of sophomore Jim Patterson.

Returning Players

Returning to the infield will be the brilliant sophomore second base combination of John Hager at shortstop and John Edison at second. To fill the gaps left at third and first by graduation, Campbell plans to use a promising freshman, Bob Newey and junior All American, respectively. Jack Manning is the only veteran outfielder on hand for the trip, but freshman Fritz Dye is moving from the infield to the outfield, and help is also looked for from Russ Dawson and frosh pitcher, Jim Hays of last year's freshman nine.

After their return from the south, the Cranes will play a six-game 11-game slate. High points in the schedule, in addition to the interstate prep school league series, will be home-and-home series with Rusch, Pontiac and Hamtramck high schools. Cranbrook will play a pair of games with each of these teams last season.

Frank Walsh, professional at Red Run Country Club here next summer's Motor City Open golf tournament will be held, gets all enthused when he mentions the event and its possibilities for the circuit. It is one of the outstanding major tournaments ever to be held in Michigan.

The silver haired veteran of the fairways points out that the field will undoubtedly include not only the biggest names in golf, but some of the youngsters who have hit the glory road only recently. His reason for including them all in, is based on the fact that all of them will be in this area anyway, inasmuch as the National PGA tournament is scheduled for Columbus, Ohio the previous week. Official dates for the Red Run tournament have finally been set for July 1, 2, 3 and 4.

Many of the best young pros and some of the old timers from far off parts of the U. S. A. would not make the long journey to the Midwest merely to compete in any of the usual tournaments on the circuit. Frank points out. However, all who can qualify will be playing in Columbus and because the Motor City Open this year will be promoted in a manner that will stamp it as one of the best and most lucrative tournaments of them all, it is only natural that all of the pros who can possibly do so, will want to stick around and play for a cut of the \$15,000 prize money and some of the other swell prizes that will be offered. One of these prizes will be an expensive automobile.

Frank, always enthusiastic about the quality and condition of Red Run's golf courses, says that many of the competitors will be playing under the most ideal conditions of their careers. He stated that many of the big name players who have played the layout in frequent exhibition matches, have conformed to him that it is certainly to be numbered among the real, plush courses of the nation. Players who have played the layout in the past few summers include Byron Nelson, Ben Hogan, Jimmy Demetree, and Gene Harbert.

Cosponsorship of the tournament by the Detroit Automobile Dealers Association is another feature that appeals to Walsh. Aside from the fact that there is to be another of the popular dealer-pro tournaments to be played a day before the tournament officially opens, this live wire group lends much to the good fellowship and color that goes along with any big sports promotion.

They say that the pros still are talking about the dealer-pro event of two years ago, at Mendoc Brook, in which Marv Frost won the big Lincoln that was given as the grand prize. Marv's bank roll was increased by the prize money, and the winning of the automobile made his stay in Detroit a memorable and profitable one. All of the pros, big name and no-name alike, will be anxious to dip into this special pot again this year. The tournament committee and the automobile men promise a raft of prizes besides the automobile, too.

Walsh is, first, last and always, a golf pro and while his main interest lies with the tournament itself, he admits that the new feature of holding an automobile show in front of the Red Run club house is going to be the scene of the first major automobile show to be held in Detroit since before the war.
