Will Report on Church Conference to Ruth Shain Class

When the Ruth Shain International Affairs Class meets promptly at 10:00 a.m. Tuesday, March 7 in the Community House, Mrs. John K. Ormond will present a report of the findings of the National Study Conference on Churches in our economic life.

Mrs. Ormond attended this conference which met recently in Detroit. The committee, headed by Charles Tetz of Cincinnati, is a

segment of the whole Federal Council of Churches.

At the meeting two weeks ago, there were delegates from 28 denominations, each having 20 delegates with power to act on the resolutions.

Each delegate was given a questionnaire dealing with world economy and security problems and the results from the resolutions and questionnaires are to be presented as a program of preliminary steps to be taken governmentally. The churches have been given a grant by the Rockefeller foundation to make this study.

The March 14 meeting will feature a three way conversation piece on the realities of Point Four, of Truman's 1949 international address.

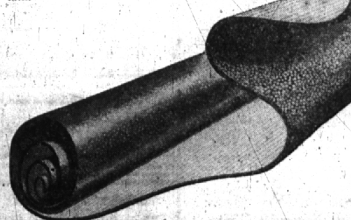
