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AAUW Scholarship Program Is Now In Sixth Year

Mrs. Milton F. Mallerer, president of the Birmingham branch of the AAUW, has announced that the American Association of University Women is celebrating the fifth anniversary of its program of international grants through which the organization finances study in the United States by women students from war-devastated countries.

In February 1945, three months before VE Day, the AAUW fellowship funds committee met to launch this project and by September of that year enough money was contributed by the branches to bring six women from countries which had recently been liberated by the U. S. for study here.

This semester, as the sixth year of the program starts, there are 35 women from 14 countries in the States on AAUW international grants in 29 colleges and universities, these women, most of them already leaders in their fields at home, are gaining knowledge and acquiring techniques which they can take back to use in reconstruction of their homelands.

In the five years of the project's operation, 155 women from 20 lands have gained needed education in their special fields or professions through these funds.

She is also studying voice with Frederick Prothero.

Betty Pearce, who studied at Trinity College in London, England, is a member of the Fine Arts Trio and of the Royal Oak Music Club.

Mrs. Laske will present a group of Debussy numbers including "La Fille aux Cheveux Bleus", "Prelude in A minor", "Clair de lune", "La Cathedrale Engloutie" and "Jardins sous La Pluie".

She studied with Joseph Brinkman of Ann Arbor and attended Arthur Schnabel's master class for three summers and has also worked with Reginald Goodwin of Toronto.

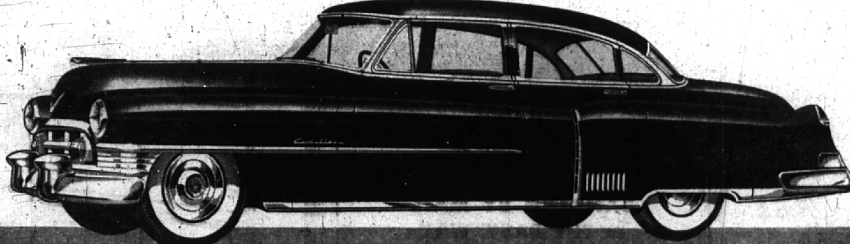
