Marion Nevill Kirk will speak on the work of her father, Arthur Nevill Kirk at the Detroit Institute of Arts on Tuesday, March 29, at 8:00 p.m. The lecture which Miss Kirk will illustrate by numerous slides, will show many of the silver pieces made by Kirk over a period of several years.

On the program of the 1950 exhibition for Michigan Artistic Craftsmen at the Detroit Institute of Arts, it is written: "In recognition of his distinguished achievement in the field of metal work, the Institute has invited Arthur Nevill Kirk to exhibit a special group of his silver and enamel work as a feature of the fifth exhibition now in progress."

As a master silversmith, Kirk has created finely wrought objects in silver and gold which are now in churches, museums and private collections both in England and America. His most important commissions include work done for the Archbishop of Wales; Corpus Christi College, Oxford; the National Cathedral, Washington, D. C.; and an extensive group at Christ Church Cranbrook.

Mrs. Grace Riley of the Birmingham Travel service was among the more than 100 guest passengers when the United Airlines Hawaiian Strato-Cruiser visited Detroit last week. She had as her guest on the flight, Mrs. Robert Reinhart.

The huge, double-deck ship took off from Willow Run on an one-hour flight over Ypsilanti, Ann Arbor, Toledo and Detroit, carrying about 55 passengers on each flight.

Mrs. Riley described the ship as being one of the most comfortable means of transportation she has ever experienced. While in the air, passengers were taken on a tour of the craft, viewing two compartments which may be turned into extra sleeping quarters at night, and the cocktail lounge.

The ship, which makes the run from San Francisco to Hawaii in about nine hours, normally carries a crew of five, she said. It is used exclusively on this route.
