

**Franklin Youth
Is Huskies' New
Hockey Captain**

HOUGHTON, March 17—Colway M. Adams of 32900 Telegraph, Franklin, will captain the Michigan College of Mining and Technology hockey team next year. He was elected to that post by his teammates at the college's hockey banquet last week.

Adams is a first-string blue-line man. Alert, fast, and always on the job, he is a hard but clean checker and was sent to the penalty box for only 21 minutes of the whole season's play.

At Ann Arbor, he played the full 60 minutes of each of the two games against the University of

Michigan. In addition to his fine defense work, Connie took top honors this year for scoring by defensing, accounting for six goals and seven assists.

In spite of the bus accident early in the season, in which one player was killed and several were injured, Connie's team won 10 of its 17 games, including one they took from the University of Michigan. Both last year and this year, Michigan Tech is the only American college hockey team which has been able to beat the Wolverine squad.

Adams is an outstanding student as well as athlete and, while active in both varsity and intramural sports, has not flunked a subject since enrolling at Houghton.

He will graduate in 1951 with a bachelor of science degree in mechanical engineering.

He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Milton B. Adams of Franklin.
