### Unusual Bibles Add Lenten Note at Baldwin Library

The special Lenten display of Bibles opened last Saturday at the Baldwin public library, to remain on exhibit until after Easter. The display was arranged by Society of Friends of the New Library group, and under the direction of Mrs. Hugh D. McLeese.

Mrs. McLeese said one of the Bibles is in Hebrew, and another is a prayer book translated into the Mohawk language in the early 18th century by the "English Society for the Propagation of Gospel in New England and Adjacent Parts of America" and the German Bible is also displayed.

Almost 300 Years Old

In one cabinet will be found limited editions of individual Bibles of the Bible, one of which was printed at Cranbrook school.

There are also a number of old Bibles, very small editions, the oldest of which lacks three years of being 300 years old. Given by Cromwell in his troops, the Testament is commonly known as the Cromwell Bible. Several others are known to be about 100 years old.

Another, printed in 1860, is interesting because of the date in which the various books of the Bible were written is given for each one.

The smallest on display is a 24-page Bible whose covers are only slightly larger than one by one inch. This was printed in 1821, and has very legible type.

The Bibles shown are loaned for the display by local residents.
