Enlistments for direct assignment to the U. S. Army's 14th Regimental Combat Team, currently stationed at Camp Carson, Colorado, are now authorized, according to an announcement made by S/Sgt. Herbert E. Swift, of the local Army and Air Force Recruiting Office.

Men with prior service in any branch of the armed forces and those enlisting for the first time are eligible for this special assignment with an old established, honored army unit which offers training in all phases of army life from mountain climbing to training for special army ski troops," Sgt. Swift said.

## SEWER RE-ASSESSMENT IN THREE PAYMENTS

Reassessment payments for the Lincoln-Purdy interceptor sewer will be spread in three payments over two years, the city commission has decided.

The reassessment for \$40,490.53 almost equaled the original assessment of \$42,000. At the time the contract was awarded last August, the commission pointed out the costs would be about double the first 1947 estimate.
