Upon their return from a wedding trip to the south, Mr. and Mrs. Martin will make their home in the country near Oxford, Mich.

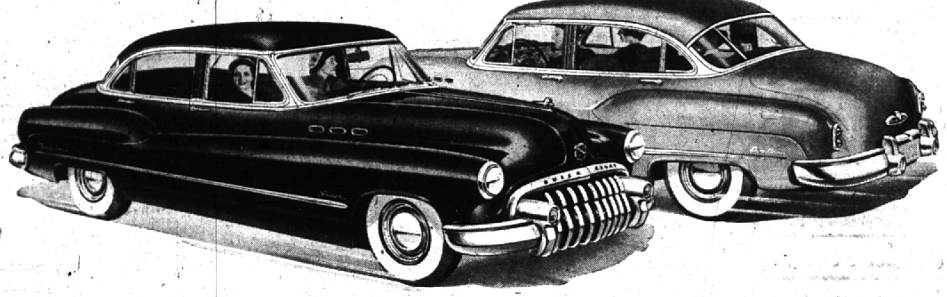
## Club Postpones Tea

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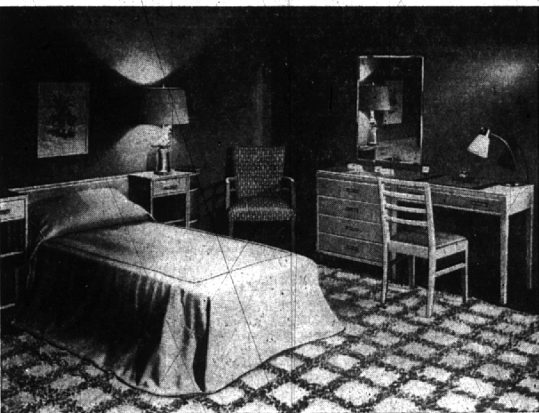
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
