

Name Study Grant After Mrs. John

The Birmingham branch of AAUW, recently established the policy of naming its contribution to the international AAUW study grant in honor of active charter members.

The branch was founded in 1919 and still has many active charter members who contribute much to the organization and community. In future years, it is planned to honor past presidents and outstanding members of the group.

The purpose of the Fellowship program is to bring scholars from war torn countries to the States for study. Some of the money also goes to establish American fellowships which afford women scholars in American opportunity to study subjects of their choice.

This year the grant was made in honor of Hildegard Hagerman John (Mrs. W. A. P. John) who is one of the original charter members and who also belonged to the original executive board as secretary and served an extensive period as secretary of the state board.

Ruth Edgar Shain, (Mrs. Charles Shain) in whose name a study grant was made last year, was the first active charter member to be so honored.

The Birmingham branch became even more keenly interested in the Fellowship when one of its own members, Mrs. William Milligan, served as state Fellowship chairman in 1948-49.

Each year a style show and tea is held for the purpose of raising money for the grant and at which time the graduating seniors from the local and nearby high schools are entertained.

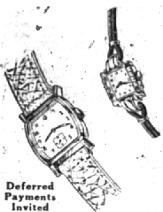
