Five Boys Injured As Their Car Hits Telephone Pole

Waterford Resident Held on Indecent Exposure Charge

Barnum Pupil Hit By Car as She Chases Scarf

William Ralph of Waterford is being held in the county jail on an indecent exposure charge after he was arrested Tuesday in Bloomfield Hills police.

Five youths were injured, three seriously, Tuesday evening as their car hit a telephone pole and trees on Spruell road, one-half mile south of East Long Lake road.

Most seriously injured was the driver David O'Connor, 16, of Royal Oak. He is in St. Joseph Mercy Hospital, Pontiac, in critical condition.

James Dunne, 16, 1701 Baumart, Royal Oak, has ground glass in both eyes and possible fractured vertebrae.

Richard LaMothe, 14, of Florence street, Clawson, sustained head lacerations on the left forearm.

William David, 14, of 1248 Ottawa, Royal Oak, and Ronnie Marzale, 740 Trinway, Birmingham, were treated and released from the hospital.

All the youths were thrown out of the car. Force of the collision broke off a tree but the telephone pole stood intact.

According to Clark Greer, Bloomfield Township police chief the road is often used for "drill rides" because of its rolling surface.

O'Connor got his driver's license three months ago.

One of the best ways to tell an inexperienced driver from an experienced cross-country driver is to watch the way they round a curve.

The inexperienced driver usually brakes the car too late, hangs desperately onto the steering wheel, and careens around the bend with tires squealing. The skilled, veteran motorist, on the other hand, takes the curve gracefully and effortlessly.

The experienced driver heels these principles:

1. If he needs to slow down for the curve, he brakes lightly and gradually well ahead of it.
2. After entering the turn, he applies enough gas to keep his speed constant or even to accelerate gently. Feeding steady power to the wheels helps them grip the pavement, gives better control. This technique enables women to negotiate every sharp curve without "flipping" the steering wheel.
3. Rounding a curve skillfully is not only safer, it's a lot easier on the car and is more comfortable for passengers—they don't feel the centrifugal pull so much. Children, in particular, are less likely to be tossed unexpectedly around.

Barbara Haworth, 12, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William Haworth of Riverwood drive, sustained abrasions of the legs, arms and face Tuesday afternoon as she was struck by an automobile after she had stepped out of a school bus on 13 Mile road near Southfield.

She was taken to St. Joseph Mercy hospital, where she is being kept for observation. Her mother said yesterday that if a boy would be taken, but she didn't believe the girl's condition was serious.

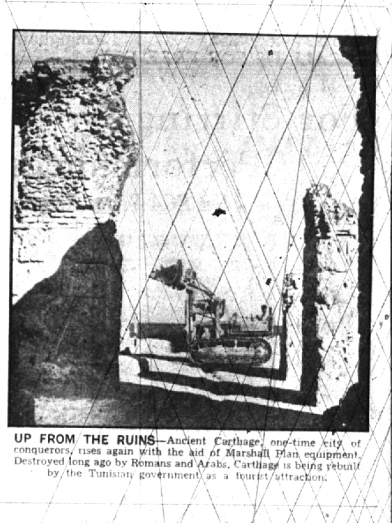
