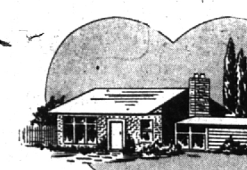

### Church Speaker

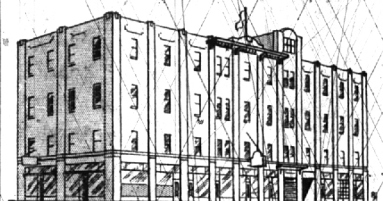
