Senior prefects Frank Rigas and John Manley unveiled the portraits of Mr. and Mrs. Booth, modified reproductions of paintings owned by Warren Booth, their son. The originals were painted in 1936 by Harold Brett of Boston who also painted the

reproductions, a gift to the school from the Cranbrook Foundation.

Weak Assessments Blamed for Lack of Education Funds

WALNUT LAKE — A joint meeting of parents and teachers from West Bloomfield school consolidation area met at the Town hall Tuesday evening, May 16, to hear C. L. Taylor, deputy superintendent of public instruction.

His topic, "Schools Are What You Make Them", put the solution of local and state problems squarely up to the people who can solve them, the voters and parents.

Taylor said one reason for lack of educational funds today is that counties are assessed for only a fraction of their true value. He said government, as well as schools, is affected by this.

TAYLOR REFERRED to the Area Study Bill recently passed by the state legislature, as the most vital piece of legislation in recent years. It offers a plan to

permit high school graduates to stay at home for junior college education.

He said, "People of the community must enter into the planning of this project in order to meet the future needs of education in the area. There are thousands of unemployed young people, 15 years old, inadequately trained and too young to qualify for regular employment."

CLIFFORD SMART from Walled Lake and W. W. Abbott of West Bloomfield joined Taylor in a panel discussion. This brought out that suitable teachers are hard to find because of low salaries and the housing shortage. High school teachers are available but there is a need for qualified elementary teachers.

The meeting was sponsored by the League of Women Voters.
