

Second-Class Mail Must Meet New Specifications

Mailers of second class matter must comply with certain new rules and regulations which would continue to have "newspaper treatment" for their material. Acting Postmaster Bernard Fowler, acting on orders from Washington, said this week.

This applies also to mailers of so-called "time value" third class material such as advertising stock reports and the like, but only if they are to be mailed in bulk.

"In order to continue receiving preferential treatment for this type mail, users must deliver their material to the post office in labeled "direct" sacks or bundles, according to quantity," he explained.

ALL COPIES for each delivery zone or station should be in one bundle. This is additional to complying with other requirements at the time of making up the mail.

"Mailers are requested to post these bundles or sacks at times when the peak load of the post office has slackened off, to permit handling at the convenience of postal clerks. Late afternoon and early morning hours are the best times for posting in these classifications.

Tips on Touring

My eyesight is about normal, neither especially good nor bad, but I have never suffered on long trips from a weariness common to a great many drivers—eye strain.

You can minimize, or even entirely eliminate, eye strain and fatigue with these three rules:

(1) Keep the windshield spotless—even to the point of cleaning it four or five times a day on long trips. Specks of dust, almost invisible to the naked eye, are always present on the windshield and they distort and reflect rays of sunlight and the glare of oncoming cars at night. Such distortion is inevitably tiring on a long trip.

(2) Eye glasses, like windshields, collect an amazing amount of nearly invisible dust and the wise driver will wipe his glasses frequently every half hour or so. Wear light colored sun glasses if the sun or snow glare is especially strong—and keep them clean.

(3) Rest your eyes frequently with glances to the sides of the road, but far enough ahead so that objects do not flash past in quick confusion. And take it easy with a trick of veteran truckers and salesmen: every day for long periods; they take a five-minute break every hour on the hour.

With these rules and a little common sense you will have little or no eye strain from driving—no matter how long the trip.
