

Dr. Beck Speaks on Socialized Medicine

Fidelis Club members of the First Baptist Church entertained their husbands at a supper meeting last week. Guest speaker of the evening was Dr. O. O. Beck who pointed out some facts concerning the proposed National Health program and how it might affect the present and future health of the nation.

The present health record is good, Dr. Beck said, and constantly improving. "It is better when fairly compared, than any nation in the world. The life span is now 67 years compared to 49 years at the turn of the century, and 35 years at the birth of our nation."

Dr. Beck continued: "In England under socialized medicine, the doctors are so rushed with the increase in patients and form reports to the government that proper care cannot be given each patient."

SO MANY WITH trivial ills of the head, Dr. Beck said, that the time seriously ill patients suffer because of lack of hospital beds. The death rate in England has risen somewhat in the last two years.

"Though faults exist in the present system," Dr. Beck stated, "an improvement in the voluntary health insurance plans would be superior than a compulsory National Health insurance program and would give the individual more efficient medical aid without the increase in cost due to government regulations and red tape."

Dr. Beck continued: "Doctors are supposed to be servants of the people and not of the government."

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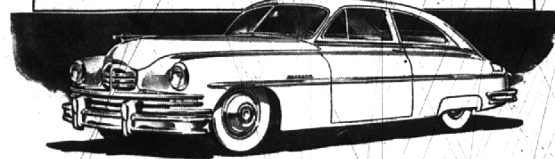
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
