 last year's budget will require only \$5,000 for 1950-51 to give this group a \$10,000 working capital.  
 DPW: 10 per cent increase to provide services to increased population.  
 Street lighting: addition of 14 or 15 more street lights.  
 Forestry & Parks: reflects a minimum budget.  
 Greenwood cemetery: actual needs are in excess of former \$2,000 budget.

**EQUIPMENT FUND:** contemplates additional police car, rubbish load packer, additional car in motor pool.  
 Debt service: reflects highest point in debt schedule.  
 Capital improvements: to provide urgently needed improvements.  
 The tax levy will be applied on a personal property valuation for 1950 of \$2,255,980. This is an increase of \$126,700 over last year.  
 The city assessor's office said real property values for 1950 will amount to \$28,378,060, or a net increase of \$2,856,080. This is composed of \$1,790,940 in the total assessed value of new commercial and residential developments during 1949, and assessment adjustments which netted a \$1,119,060 increase. The assessor dropped \$14,940 in assessments from the 1950 roll as the result of buildings torn down or move out of the city during 1949.

 tion of the lots and other revenue-producing parking facilities, including parking meters.  
 Ann Arbor's three-tier parking structure can handle about 250 cars.  
 Mayor Brown stated:  
 "Concrete devices is already available to indicate that adequate off-street parking facilities will influence the decision of private businesses to improve their present business sites or to undertake construction of new buildings."  
 "Consequently, it is logical to expect that the assessed valuation of the central business district served by the new parking structure will increase rather than decline."

"OUR PRESENT RATES are cheap, being at the rate of 5c for the first two hours and 3c for each additional two hours. The whole parking program has been designed for the convenience of shoppers."  
 "We feel that the money received from the parking meters and other parking facilities is a trust fund for the benefit of the city and the convenience of its citizens has been put to its best use. The enthusiasm with which our citizens have accepted the program is indicative of its soundness."

Members of the city plan commission, its publicity committee and several city officials met Tuesday evening with Charles Barr, Michigan State college planning expert who is conducting a land use survey of Birmingham.  
 Barr explained his method of obtaining such a survey, and answered many questions on planning, what it is for and how it is applied to a community.  
 He said his local survey and recommendations would be ready next fall.

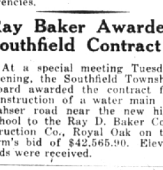
