**A Zoltan Sepeshy Painting**

An exhibit of the paintings and drawings of Zoltan Sepeshy is currently being shown at the Cranbrook academy of art, where he is resident art director.

Sepeshy, born in Hungary, came to Detroit in 1920 after receiving his formal art education in Budapest and Vienna academies. Until 1932 he did various jobs in Detroit while trying to establish himself as an artist.

In 1932 he was appointed resident instructor at Cranbrook and devoted himself to teaching art and painting.

His first one-man show in 1932 was held in the Newhouse galleries, New York. Four years later his second show was held at the Marie Sterner galleries there.

ALTHOUGH HE has worked in oil, gouache and water color, his first two exhibits were largely devoted to tempera. Sepeshy has come to prefer this medium because of its brilliance and pliant color.

Other exhibitions of his have hung in New York's Midtown galleries; Chicago and Brooklyn annual international watercolor exhibitions; Whitney Museum of American art, New York; Corcoran gallery's biennial exhibition of American painting, Washington; Chicago art institute's exhibition of American painting and sculpture; Golden Gate exposition in San Francisco, and the Great Lakes exhibition where his "Yellow Farm" was a prize winner.

From this time on his prestige as master of the tempera technique came to be widely recognized.

In 1946 his book, "Tempera Technique" was published.

Patrons of the arts know him for his use of color and his technique in reproducing scenes of industry and landscape.

He has reproduced Detroit industrial scenes and wilds of northern Michigan with equal skill and sensitiveness. Many of his landscapes are of grim, bleak areas, which hold the observer by the sheer brilliance of his portrayal.

In addition to the paintings which have been purchased by private collectors or institutions, Sepeshy has won many prizes in the competitive field.

Since 1938 he has been a regular exhibitor in all national and international invitational shows.

In 1946 he was elected to the American academy of arts and
