To Speak Here

Christ Church men will hear Dr. Alfred Haake, nationally known economist, speak on "Is Private Competitive Enterprise Compatible with Christianity?" at their next meeting on May 8 at the men's club and all men of the Birmingham-Bloomfield area are invited to attend with their guests. Reservations must be made at the church in advance.

Dr. Haake is an industrial consultant, economist and lecturer who is serving as consultant in Chicago to General Motors. Through wide experience, he is acquainted with the three sides of the economic picture—a labor, management and political.

The speaker began teaching economics at Wisconsin and later was professor of economics and head of that department at Rutgers College.

From 1923-25 he was head of the Bureau of Industrial Economics and advisor to large advertisers in Detroit and neighboring cities.

In 1928, Dr. Haake helped to organize and became managing director of the National Association of Furniture Manufacturers remaining in this position until 1942. He was also publisher of the magazine "Furniture Management."

He has appeared frequently on the radio program "Wake Up America" which he helped organize and has been mayor of Park Ridge, Ill. since 1945. Dr. Haake is also a trustee of the National Small Business Men's Association; a member of the Board of Social Missions of the United Lutheran Church in America; serves on the advisory committee of Spiritual Mobilization and is a former member of the Labor Board Panel in Chicago.

Past president of the Rotary Club and the Executives Club, he is also a member of the City Club, all in Chicago.

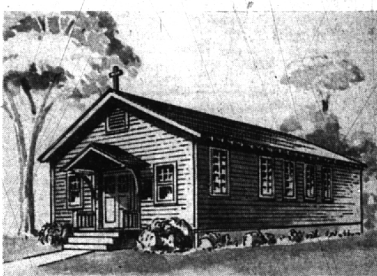
The Rev. Andrew Zelle of Saginaw, president of the Michigan district of the Lutheran church, will be the preacher at the morning service, at 11 o'clock.
