

CH Names Board Members; Records Busy October

During October nearly 18,000 persons used the facilities offered by the Birmingham Community House, it was revealed at the monthly meeting of the House board Monday evening.

The 368 groups meeting there required 3,753 servings of food, prepared in the House commissary. Youth groups had a total attendance of 2,611 while 816 persons availed themselves of the craft shop facilities. Adult education groups drew 1,063 participants.

Mrs. Carlton H. Isley, House director, said there was now the largest enrollment ever recorded and the adult education program lists 294 enrollees.

She has also announced the start of a Senior Workshop, a new project for senior residents co-sponsored by the Birmingham and Bloomfield Hills Junior League in conjunction with the Community House.

Mrs. C. F. Charlton, director of employment office services, reported that 524 applications had been handled last month by persons seeking employment. She ad-

ded that 875 placements had been made in 483 requests for help.

The board also elected Fred G. Per, 320 Suffolk, to replace Clyde C. Bennett who recently resigned. Mrs. George A. Weinhold, 451 Pillgrim, was named to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Mrs. Bessie A. Machus.

Whoever received the Southfield election totals by telephone at the county clearing house in Pontiac evidently misunderstood the total vote for Republican gubernatorial candidate Harry F. Kelly and gave him 200 more votes than he was supposed to receive, Southfield township clerk Mrs. Fannie Adams said this week.

She pointed out that she had not been notified of any irregularities in the township election procedure.

Tuesday the Oakland county canvassing board discovered the discrepancy and made the correction.

The Southfield count all along gave Kelly 3,146 votes, and the incorrect figures which official tabulators had been working with was 3,946, Mrs. Adams said.

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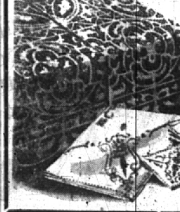
