For first time, women enroll in MSC police course

MSC Establishes Four-Year Crime Prevention Course; Department Open to Coeds

For the first time in its history, the Michigan State college department of police administration has opened its doors to women. A new four-year course in crime prevention was established this year, which will permit the entrance of coeds into the department, according to Arthur Brandstatter, department head.

Included among the five women students currently enrolled is Sherrill Williams, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph E. Williams, 511 Merrill. She is a sophomore.

ALTHOUGH IT allows women to study police work, the course isn't designed specifically for coeds. College officials expect an equal distribution of men and women to enroll.

The program was established to fill a growing demand for trained personnel, particularly women, in the field of crime prevention.

Thanksgiving Day Football Ticket Sale Going Fast

Tickets for the Birmingham-Royal Oak Thanksgiving day football game are going rapidly, according to Franklin Whitney, Birmingham school athletic director. The only seats remaining are between the 20 and 35-yard lines, he pointed out.

Whitney explained that reserved seat tickets are being sold only at the Hill school building this year. In past years they have been distributed at some stores in the city. He said that this is being done, because if tickets are sold in more than one place, the seating continuity is broken. If persons are unable to get to the office at Hill school during the day, they can phone in for reservations and their tickets will be held.

RESERVED SEAT tickets on the side are \$2. End zone seats for \$1.50 and standing room tickets for \$1 will go on sale the day of the game. The athletic director emphasized that the prices for this game are worked out through a joint committee of Royal Oak and Birmingham officials.

Police field now has a seating capacity of about 3100 persons. Before the game, about 1,080 additional seats will be moved in.

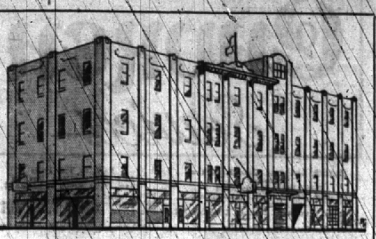
