Modern Palestine To Be Subject of A.A.U.W. Speaker

"Romance of Modern Palestine" is the subject to be presented at the meeting of the American Association of University Women on Wednesday, November 8, at the Community House.

The speaker will be Bertha Spafford Vester, head of the American Colony in Jerusalem, which was founded by Mrs. Vester's family. American born, Mrs. Vester has spent sixty-five years of her life in Palestine, from the Turkish rule, through two world wars, under British Mandate and in the present conflict between Arabs and Jews.

She tells of the land and its chief city with intimacy and understanding.

DURING WORLD WAR I, Mrs. Vester managed four hospitals in Jerusalem, since has built and managed the Anna Spafford Nursing Home with its hospital, playgrounds, and help for thousands of children of all races.

At the request of American friends, Mrs. Vester, author of "Our Jerusalem" is making a brief lecture tour of her native land.
