Kent McDonald, guest pianist, will present works of composers, Franck Debussy and Scriabine.

Nioma Sherman, soprano, accompanied by Alta Lynn Major will open the program with a set of numbers including "The Night Has A Thousand Eyes".

A TRIO, consisting of Luella Elder, pianist, Jean Elder Hohmeyer, violinist, and Flora Wager, cellist, will present "Trio in F Major," Opus 42, by Niccolò Paganini.

Mrs. Wager of Waterford, studied with Frederic Abel in Detroit and with Hans Pick of the University of Michigan. She taught cello at Case High school and at the University of New York. She is active in many musical circles and is pianist of the Tuesday Musicales of Pontiac.

Jean Elder Hohmeyer, violinist, received her training at Oberlin Conservatory and the Juillard School of Music. She later studied with Samuel Antok, director of the New Jersey Symphony.

Mrs. Robert Elder, pianist of the trio, was for many years organist in Newark and South Orange, N. J. Since making her home in Birmingham she has played before many musical groups.

Kent McDonald, organist and choir master at St. James Episcopal church, is a graduate of the Eastman School of Music. He has studied with Jose Ferrer, a Cuban virtuoso, and with Helena Moranz, world renowned Polish pianist. He held the coveted George Eastman scholarship at Eastman during undergraduate years and received a graduate fellowship.

McDonald has appeared with

the Rochester Symphony under Howard Hanson and was with them in the first performance of the new concerto by Kenneth Gurburo. He also toured for two years under the auspices of the Red Cross, playing in Veteran's Hospitals in the East.
