Area Schools Take Active Part in 1950 Torch Drive

Campaign officials for the Torch Drive announced today that of the \$60,000 received so far at headquarters, a good share has been turned in by vicinity schools.

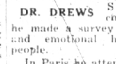
Dr. Drews, under the sponsorship of the Unitarian Fellowship, will speak at 6:45 at the Community House on Monday, Nov. 6.

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Anne Garrison To Campaign Up To Last Moment

Anne Garrison, the Birmingham housewife who is the third district Democratic candidate for the state legislature, will campaign right up to Nov. 7, she says, on a schedule of four or five talks a day to neighborhood gatherings in the living rooms of her friends.

Mrs. Garrison says: "I have spoken to hundreds of groups, always emphasizing the deteriorating mental health situation in Michigan, which is a backward state in this program, and the appropriation cuts which damaged the mental health work as well as our carefully built up protective services for children who are orphaned, neglected, handicapped or delinquent."

"I point out that what my opponent is boasting of as 'economies' are in reality costly and phony 'economies' that will cost us more in the long run than the appropriation cuts made. And they are carried out at the expense of children and mentally ill people who do not vote and for whom we should be making better, not worse, provision in the state."

"PREVENTIVE services are cheaper in the long run than care of patients in mental hospitals or custodial care for life. It is cheaper to train unfortunate children to the best of our ability, than it is to 'economize' on homes and training programs with the result that many children will unnecessarily become inmates of penal institutions."

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
