The group says that one of their families no longer needs their help and is self-supporting until the father's war injuries necessitate another trip to the hospital. He told the MOMS that they had given him strength and courage to carry on while he was in hospital and that he knew some interesting things which he was glad to give to his children. In some cases, a gift or other help is given to the group to the veteran, so that he may give the gift to the family himself.
