

Unknown Donor Is Again Buying Books At AAUW Sale for Vicinity Libraries

A Bloomfield Hills book lover is again making it possible for school and public libraries to enlarge their resources.

His plan, started last year, arranged for a "private" showing with the annual AAUW book sale so library representatives would have first choice.

He is again allowing \$400 for this purpose, including for the first time, the public libraries in Berkeley and Franklin and school libraries at Cranbrook schools and Wood.

Representatives of these, with those from Birmingham schools and Baldwin public library, will attend a preview tea at the Detroit Edition building Sunday afternoon.

THEY WILL inspect the 10,000 books and magazines on hand and make their purchases.

The plan stipulates that schools and libraries get first choice over book dealers who have followed the sale over a number of years.

An AAUW survey showed the schools reported historical and modern fiction had been acquired which library budgets had made impossible before.

Technical books were also eagerly sought by the schools.

Miss Jeanne Lloyd, Baldwin Public Librarian, said she was able to obtain out-of-print books along with several technical books for which there had been much demand.

THE DONOR evolved his plan because he has long regretted that many fine books, donated by the community, were purchased by dealers and taken out of Birmingham.

The 23rd annual sale will open to the public Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Friday will be from 8 a.m. to 9 p.m. on Tuesday and Wednesday hours from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.

YMCA Membership Drive Ends Monday

Sealed bids for the purchase of tax lien certificates of the School District of the City of Birmingham, Oakland County, Michigan, of the net value of \$175,000, will be received by the undersigned at the offices of the Board of Education of said school district, corner of Chestnut and Main Streets, in the City of Birmingham, Michigan, until 8 o'clock on the 15th day of October, 1950, at which time and place they shall be publicly opened and read.

The bids shall be dated November 1, 1949, and will mature February 1, 1951, and 2 year interest at a rate not exceeding 10 per annum. Both principal and interest shall be payable at the Birmingham National Bank, in the City of Birmingham, Michigan. Denominations of the notes shall be at the option of the purchaser. Each bid shall state the annual interest rate upon which it is submitted expressed in multiples of 1/4 of 1 per cent. The date of delivery of the notes shall be the date the purchaser is to be issued in satisfaction of the collection of the 1949 taxes.

For the purpose of awarding the notes to the bidder who bids the lowest interest rate on the notes from November 1, 1949, to the date of delivery therefrom any premium. The notes will be awarded to the bidder who bids the lowest interest rate upon the notes from the above computation produces the lowest interest rate to the school district. No proposal for less than all of the notes will be considered.

A certified check in the amount of \$3,500 drawn upon an approved bank or trust company and payable to the order of the undersigned, or the Board of Education of the School District of the City of Birmingham, Michigan, shall be a condition of the award. No interest shall be allowed on the good faith checks.

Bids shall be conducted upon the unqualified approval of Claude H. Stevens, of Berry, Stevens, Barkley & Eddy, attorneys, Detroit, Michigan, approving the legality of the notes. The vote of the opinion will be held by the school district and the cost of the notes will be determined by the purchaser. The executed notes will be delivered to the Detroit, Michigan.
