

# Dwelling Ordinance Approval by Troy Township Board

In an effort to have a uniform setback line for houses in Troy township, the township board last week approved an amendment to the zoning ordinance.

According to the amendment, each dwelling will be set back from the front or street line at least 30 feet, unless a longer or shorter distance has been established by common use on the same street.

IF A COMMON set back hasn't been established on a street where there are two or more dwellings, then the set back from the front

or street line shall be established by the building inspector.

The ordinance stipulates that in case of undue hardship, application can be made to the board of appeals.

The amendment will become effective Nov. 12. The township zoning commission recommended the new ordinance to the board.

Reservations for the trip can be made by telephoning the 'Y' or calling at the offices at 144 West Maple. Adults as well as children are invited, Kirbert emphasized.

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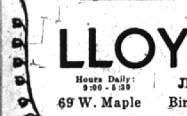
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## Engineering Society Hears Talk On Grid
