

Southfield Board Court Appearance Again Postponed

For the second time, Southfield township's appearance in court to show why it should not pay a \$17,224.44 claim to the Southfield school board was postponed.

The court appearance is now set for Monday, Oct. 30. It was originally scheduled for Sept. 25 and postponed to Oct. 11. Reason is to give attorneys more time to study the case.

The school board said the money is owed it from past state land scavenger sales collected in the township.

Tuesday evening, the township board approved the first part of a recommendation of the zoning board for a change in the zoning ordinance. The board approved increased building restrictions for certain areas in Beverly Hills west of Southfield road.

SUPERVISOR D. P. FRAME and Mrs. Fannie Adams, township clerk were authorized by the board to negotiate bids for road improvement construction in Berkshire Valley and Golfhurst and Magnolia subdivisions.

After Thomas J. Langan suggested that action should be started on plans for the new fire hall, the board approved the idea. An architect will be contacted this week and asked to submit a proposal for his services.

The board postponed consideration of boosting the salary of the township dog catcher until the next meeting. The salary is now \$2000 a year plus commission.

Board members approved a motion by Frame that in "the interest of economy" no more advertising of the minutes of the board be published until the end of the fiscal year.

Birmingham Whips Ferndale, 31-0, For Its 1st Win

Piling up a quiet but tough defense, all scored on runs of 25 yards or longer, a polished Birmingham eleven displayed a stunning combination of jarring power and precise timing coupled with indomitable will to win, to topple favored Ferndale 31-0 in a league game on the latter's home field Friday night.

This marked the first victory in three starts for Birmingham, and only the second win over Ferndale in 11 years.

THE MAPLES' sparkling running attack netted an impressive 219 yards good for ten first downs while the Raisplitzners were held by aggressive defensive play. This included a 33 yard run by Captain Jerry Gillikin in the last quarter with the entire Marion first string watching from the bench.

In the opening minutes, Birmingham's offense flexed its muscles for the first time. Sparked by the running of Captain Gordon Shira and star halfback Tom Tracy, the Maple attack gained 43 yards.

Speedy right half Chuck Tyson, carrying the ball for the first time in the game, dashed 30 yards for the first tally of the game.

Tracy's kick for the conversion was blocked.

Don Moore punted out of bounds on the Birmingham 35, and the Maples opened their second drive into rival territory.

Tracy shook himself free for a 25-yard sprint for the Maple's second score.

BIRMINGHAM'S ATTEMPT for the extra point was thwarted when halfback Don Halpin, forced to run after picking up a bad center pass, was nailed short of the goal line.

Tracy's kick was returned to the Ferndale 35. On the second play, the Maples opened their preceding Maple tully Art Fairbanks, lanky left end, intercepted quarterback Tom Tracy's pass on the Raisplitzners' 41 and galloped all the way to score for Birmingham.

One of this season's biggest headaches thus far cropped up again when Tracy's attempt to run the extra point was stopped.

Late in the second stanza, Tracy took Moore's punt on his own 19 yard stripe and brought the crowd to its feet by reeling off 81 yards in his second score of the evening.

TRACY'S BOOT for the point went wide.

The only serious bid for a touchdown by the Raisplitzners was made early in the first period. The only pass attempt for the first time in the Birmingham defense dug in to hold Ferndale a yard short of a first down.

The Maples bounced back with a 98-yard march to score their final tally.

Tyson broke loose with a 33-yard touchdown dash to wrap up the game for Birmingham. The final trimmings were added when halfback Bud Kraus ran wide around right end to score the extra point.

ORDINANCE NUMBER 497
AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND SECTION 2-12 OF THE CHARTER OF THE CITY OF BIRMINGHAM TO ADD THE FOLLOWING TO THE LIST OF THE SECTIONS TO BE KNOWN AS "SECTION 2-12":

"SECTION 2-12. Property described as Section 2-12, through 42 of Section 2-12, subdivision being property located on the North side of 42nd Street, between 42nd Street and 43rd Street, shall be changed from 'Business-A' Classification.

ORDINANCE NUMBER 498
AMENDMENT TO SIGN ORDINANCE No. 249 of the City of Birmingham, Michigan, to Amend Ordinance Section 8-1 Thereof.

The City of Birmingham Ordinance No. 249 of the City of Birmingham, entitled "Sign Ordinances" be amended by adding Section 8-2 thereof to read as follows:

Section 8-2. Signs as permitted in this Ordinance shall conform to the following requirements:

(a) All signs extending beyond the building line shall be on the side of the building above the grade or sidewalk at that point.

(b) Vertical reading signs not exceeding 10 square feet in area project beyond the building line a distance not to exceed 3 feet.

(c) No sign or banner shall be erected in the public right of way and no other supporting member shall be permitted to remain in any public right of way.

(d) No sign or banner shall be strung across any public right of way.

(e) On any permanent canopy on any building, there may be erected a seasonal weather sign, which said sign shall be permanently affixed to such canopy, and shall be not to exceed two feet in overall height, nor 100 square feet of overall area. Such sign shall be located not more than three feet from the building line.

This Ordinance shall take effect immediately upon publication after the passage of the same.
